MISSION

Inspiring conservation action by creating access to science education and building community connections.



Based in Richmond, CA, Things That Creep (TTC) brings hands-on and virtual science programming into Bay Area classrooms. We also engage the community with educational public and private events. Our interactive presentations feature "animal ambassadors", safe-to-handle live lizards, snakes, and frogs. TTC's original reptile-focused curriculum, crafted by trained biologists and educators, provides an introduction to the biological sciences, opening the door to future careers in STEM fields.



The seeds of TTC were planted over ten years ago when our founder/executive director, Audra Barrios, began bringing reptiles into the preschool where she taught science. Over time, like-minded science educators joined in, developing highly educational and engaging programs. In 2018, TTC achieved 501(c)(3) status. Now bolstered by a board of dedicated educators, zoologists and conservationists, TTC continues to grow.

Through education about our native reptiles & amphibians and their vital roles, we actively engender enthusiasm and pride in our local ecosystems. Together we can make impact.



NEIGHBORHOOD SNAKES PROGRAM

PANDEMIC PIVOT

TTC entered 2020 with a contract to bring Neighborhood Snakes as a hands-on program into Richmond classrooms. *Then came Covid*.

Our dedicated team of educators and biologists pulled together and created a brand-new virtual format, complete with pre-recorded videos, interactive virtual sessions and a detailed teacher's guide.

We are proud to deliver Neighborhood Snakes in virtual form and bring this enriching program to Richmond students wherever 2020 finds them.

PROGRAM

Interactive virtual learning sessions

Led by experienced educators and biologists, featuring live "animal ambassador" snakes.

Pre-recorded videos

Introduction to common Bay Area snakes, reptile and foundational biological concepts, guided activities.

Written/illustrated curriculum

Includes science vocabulary, original illustrations, and detailed descriptions of common Bay Area snakes.

Hands-on activity

Grade appropriate, educator guided drawing, observing/recording or cut/paste/color/trace.

Meets NGSS and Common CORE standards



PILOT

We recently finished delivering our Neighborhood Snakes Program in virtual format to students at Martin Luther King Jr. elementary school in Richmond. 214 students in grades K-3rd received the complete curriculum at no cost to students or the school.

Immediate response from teachers has been positive and we are now collecting detailed feedback in order to improve the program.

As a kid, I spent summers at the nature center down the road. We would wade out in the murky bay, our shoes sinking into the thick, dark mud. Using a large screen we would sift mud to find strange creatures with no eyes or bones, like clams and worms. I loved every minute of it. Without this experience. I would have never known there was so much life around us that I did not see nor would I have become a marine biologist. After graduating college I moved to Richmond, where these science programs that I experienced as a kid did not exist. That's when I asked how could I support students from my community to learn about things that creep around us?

It started with mobile animal programs, teaching reptile and amphibian biology in classrooms. I watched the fear melt into curiosity in students' eyes. Through hands-on experiences with animals, a new kind of connection is made. If we understand what is out there, we can empathize, learn, and make small changes in our daily lives to support it. While living in urban environments, it is easy to forget that there is an ecosystem around us struggling to survive habitat loss, climate change, and pollution. The choices made in our own spaces affect the natural ecosystem in our shared home, the San Francisco Bay Area. By creating Things that Creep, I hope to provide access to science education and inspire our community to conserve the natural world.
